
information and news of Bowlers, Leagues and forthcoming attractions.

COLLEDAN 'ZIPS' SAMUELS BY 11 PINS in 2nd Scratch Singles

"GREAT!" Yes, another sanctioned Tournament run by the L.A.B.A., gets this acclamation, one that, to the Executive makes it all worth while. This, so soon after the Blue Riband Classified, was the Second Annual Scratch Singles Championship. This year the Tournament came to WEMBLEY as promised, on Sunday, 14th January. 70 men and 20 ladies took to the lanes over three squads, to roll 8 games in two series of 4, each series on a different pair of lanes.

What excitement there was, in the men's division a great standard was achieved...Figures such as an average game of 180, and average series of 1437 go a long way to prove what

Once again. the London Area has made it's mark, by launching a new great kind of Tournament. On the 26th November, and 10th December, all areas of the BTBA watched with fervent interest, the outcome of the 1st sanctioned classified tournament.

As experience shows, anything new is always regarded with scepticism, and so it was with this tournament, that entries were far lower than was hoped for. The female entrants were insufficient even to hold a final, and in consequence, the female divisions, together with division 1 for men (averages up to 135) were cancelled, and the tournament got under way with just 3 male divisions... Div 2 averages 135/ 150; Division 3...151/161; and division 4 166/175 And so 77 men rolled off in the qualifying

rounds at Stamford Hill and Tolworth - from each centre, the top each in each division qualified for the finals. At this stage, two interesting results appeared at Tolworth: John Wadley in Division2 rolled a 614 series; and Bert Pewtress, who originally entered Division 1., and agreed to bowl in division 2 when 1 was cancelled, qualified for the final.

At this stage, appreciation must be given for the Managers at ABC Stamford Hill , and Excel

Tolworth, for their great help in the first rounds.

Then, on Sunday December 10th at 1.00pm. thanks to great help of Paul Graves, and his staff at ABC North Harrow, the first squad was ready to bowl off on lanes 1 - 16 dead on time. After a few well chosen words by Danny Lever, the President of the London Area, battle commenced..... and so did the shocks..... In the first round 8 of the hot favourites had been eliminated, and by the end of round 2, the 4 qualifiers from the London Area Excutive had been relegated to their rightful duties of working!!

In round 3 the limelight was stolen by Peter Sinsbury, from Tolworth, who, bowling in Division 2 (Averages 136/150 remember), had the crowd right behind him, as he rolled a great first game of 225

he finished with a 634 series and thus assured himself of a place in the finals.

So we came to the finals.

In Division 2 Peter Sinsbury battled with fellow Tolworth Bowler, David Ratcliffe. Ratcliffe started well, and took the first game by 12 pins 159 to 147: Back came Sinsbury with a 175 against 162, and so entered the third game with a 2 pin lead: just to make sure of first place, he finished with 163 against 146 and so won 485 to 466.

In Division 3 Peter Tomei from Stamford Hill did battle with Les Gibbons from North Harrow. Les bowling at home had a good lead of 27 pins after the first game...178 - 151: but Peter rolling steadily and determinedly picked up 37 pins in the 2nd game...182 - 145 and put himself 10 pins up



and so into the third game, where he consolidated his lead with a further 7 pins 166-159 and took the trophy home to Stamford Hill with 499 to 482.

And lastly, the heavies!! Division 4 as in Division 3 proved to be another Stamford Hill - North Harrow match, and it was Bobby Skinner from the Hill who was leading by 12 pins over Alan Couch at the end of the 2nd game, with 174 & 157 against 156 & 163. Then in the 3 rd game, Bobby made sure of a second trophy for Stamford Hill by rolling a good 188, whilst Alan could only make a 117.

Continuous auditing enabled the trophies to be presented almost immediatl after the finals were finished, and....

rolling steadily for an 802 (216 h/game), and on 7 & 8, Tony Colledan exuberantly piling in a 821, including three 200 plus games with a h/game of 236. But in the 2nd 4 games, it was Tony who kept going, with a 798, whilst 'The Pond' slipped to a 767, but his 1569 was enough for second place at that time. Dave Jones dropped it and finished with a 1511 for a final 10th place. The second squad never really worried Tony and David, but in the third, when TONY SAMUELS of the Greyhounds rolled an 861 in his first set, an average of 215 all over 200, word soon got around ... could Colledan survive? But survive he did, and Samuels second set of 747, was just 11 pins short of Colledan's total...Tough for Tony Samuels, especially as the word also got around, that his zip fly broke after his 6th game. Meanwhile, BERNIE WHITE was quietly totting up his score, 812 and 764 to put David Pond into 4th final place. Many results could be mentioned if we had space so perhaps a few like DEL BROUGH for his high game of the Tourney with 267; TED MURRAY started his last series with a 124 game and finished the set with a 245 game!! RAY ARTIS, last year's Champion, kept in the limelight, and finished 13th with a 1509; and BOB LINK, with a 300 game under his belt, who finished 5th. So to the Ladies... names like SHARPE, GARRETT, MILES, BREWER, BOWEN, WHEELER, etc., could only conjure up visions of High Scores and indeed we were not disappointed, the average series was 1338, .

Dear Sir,

It has come to the attention of this office that Military Personal in the United Kingdom are competing in unsanctioned Leagues at Commercial Bowling Establishments, as you know A.B.C. members are not permitted to bowl in unsanctioned Leagues. in the case of Military bowlers in the United Kingdom, however, A.B.C. members are authorised to join and compete in B.I.B.A. sacrtioned activities without jeopardizingtheir A.B.C. membership, this is in accordance with reciprocal agreement between A.B.C. and B.T.B.A. under which both National organisations recognise each others specification programmes. To preclude the possibility of future action which might result in loss of A.B.C. membership it is requested that in your capacity as A.B.C. Military representative of the United Kingdom you council these Military bowlers appropriatly.
